About Auckland

Auckland is New Zealand's largest city and its vibrant economic and cultural hub. ABOUT THE FIH HOCKEY NATIONS CUP

The FIH Hockey Nations Cup is an annual tournament that involves some of the best hockey playing nations of the world and acts as a pathway to the FIH Hockey Pro League, to which it introduces a relegation/promotion axis, with the first placed team in the FIH Hockey Nations Cup getting the opportunity to replace the bottom placed team in the FIH Hockey Pro League in the subsequent year.

Additionally in 2025, FIH introduced the Hockey Nations Cup 2, which would add another tier below the Nations Cup, with the team winning the Nations Cup 2 earning the opportunity to replace the bottom placed team of the Nations Cup in the subsequent season.

The FIH Hockey Nations Cup features the best eight teams (by world rankings) that are not a part of the FIH Hockey Pro League, in both men's and women's competitions. The eight teams are split into two pools of four teams each, with the top two teams in each pool proceeding to the semi-finals, while the bottom two teams from each pool will play for 5-8 place classification.

The FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup will run from 15-21 March 2025 in Auckland, New Zealand. The complete match schedule including match timings are [available here](#).

The India women's hockey team arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 as the highest-ranked team and one of the most exciting sides in the competition. With a proud hockey tradition and a passionate following, India have firmly established themselves among the leading nations in the women's game through a blend of tactical discipline, technical quality and relentless intensity.

Known for their organised defensive structure and rapid attacking transitions, India combine composure in possession with the pace and creativity to threaten opponents across all areas of the pitch. Their ability to press aggressively, recover quickly and launch incisive counter-attacks has made them a formidable opponent against top-ranked teams on the international stage.

India's recent years at the elite level have included appearances at the Olympic Games, FIH Hockey Women's World Cup and the FIH Hockey Pro League, where they competed until 2025. The squad continues to benefit from a core group of experienced internationals alongside emerging young talent eager to make their mark.

Players such as goalkeeper Savita, captain Salima Tete, Navneet Kaur and Lalremsiami bring valuable international experience and leadership to a side that thrives on energy, unity and adaptability. With a balanced squad capable of controlling possession or striking quickly on transition, India enter the Nations Cup determined to challenge for the title and secure a quick return to the FIH Hockey Pro League.

Japan arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 as one of the leading contenders for promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League. Renowned for their technical precision, speed and intelligent movement, Japan continue to be one of Asia's most consistent performers on the international stage.

Having featured at the Olympic Games Paris 2024, Japan remain among the world's top-ranked sides and bring valuable experience from competing regularly against elite opposition. Their structured style of play, sharp passing combinations and disciplined defensive organisation make them a difficult side to break down, while their planned transitions and movement off the ball allow them to create scoring opportunities against even the strongest opponents.

As the new Olympic cycle rolls on, Japan continue to invest in the development of a youthful squad, combining emerging talent with players already carrying significant international experience. The likes of Miyu Suzuki, Mai Toriyama and captain Amiru Shimada provide leadership and composure within a group that continues to evolve with confidence and ambition.

Japan have qualified for every Olympic Games since Athens 2004, underlining the consistency and strength of their programme. With a talented generation eager to establish itself among the world's elite, Japan will see the Nations Cup as an important opportunity to push towards the top tier of international hockey and claim a place in the FIH Hockey Pro League.

The United States women's hockey team arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 determined to secure a return to the FIH Hockey Pro League following relegation in 2024. Known for their athleticism, work ethic and physical intensity, the United Eagles continue to develop into an increasingly competitive force on the world stage.

The USA built significant momentum during the previous Olympic cycle, highlighted by qualification for the Olympic Games Paris 2024 where they competed strongly against some of the world's leading teams. Their recent performances in Pan American competition have further reinforced the progress of a programme blending experienced internationals with an exciting generation of young talent emerging through the collegiate pathway.

Traditionally recognised for their high-energy pressing and direct attacking style, the United States combine physical strength with increasing tactical maturity and composure in possession. The squad's depth and versatility allow them to adapt effectively to different opponents and match situations, making them one of the most dangerous teams in the competition.

With ambitions of reclaiming their place among the world's elite, the United States enter the Nations Cup with confidence and determination. A successful campaign in New Zealand would mark another important step forward for a side eager to return to the FIH Hockey Pro League and continue building towards future major international tournaments, including the Olympics at home in LA 2028.

The Uruguay women's hockey team, known as the Cimarronas, arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 with growing confidence and momentum following a series of impressive international performances. Traditionally recognised for their fighting spirit and attacking flair, Uruguay have steadily risen through the international rankings and continue to establish themselves as one of the emerging forces in world hockey.

Uruguay's recent success includes a runners-up finish at the inaugural FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup 2, where they showcased their attacking quality and composure under pressure throughout the tournament. Their rise was further underlined by a historic bronze medal at the 2025 Pan American Cup, marking the programme's first ever podium finish at the continental event.

When at their attacking best, Uruguay are among the most entertaining sides in international hockey. Combining quick transitions with aggressive forward play, the Cimarronas possess the ability to unsettle opponents with their pace, creativity and willingness to commit players forward. Experienced internationals such as Teresa Viana and Manuela Vilar continue to provide leadership and attacking inspiration for the side.

Blending seasoned players with emerging talent, Uruguay arrive in New Zealand aiming to continue their upward trajectory and prove they can compete consistently against the world's top teams. With belief growing across the squad, the Nations Cup presents another major opportunity for the Cimarronas to make their mark on the international stage.

The Chile women's hockey team, known as Las Diablas, have become one of the fastest-rising teams in international hockey, driven by passion and a strong collective identity. Their recent progress on the world stage has established Chile as a highly competitive side capable of challenging established hockey nations.

Chile have enjoyed a period of sustained success in continental competition, highlighted by strong performances at the Pan American Championships and South American Games, along with their historic debut appearance at the FIH Hockey Women's World Cup 2022, which they have followed up with a second consecutive qualification to the 2026 edition of the World Cup, and an all-time best world ranking of 11!

Their development has continued in recent editions of the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup, where they followed a seventh-place finish in their debut appearance, with a bronze medal performance in the previous edition.

One of Chile's greatest strengths lies in the experience and cohesion within the squad. Players such as Manuela Urroz, Fernanda Flores, Denise Losada, Sofia Filipek and Constanza Palma bring significant international experience and leadership to a side that combines tactical discipline with attacking ambition.

As they arrive in New Zealand, Chile will be aiming to build on their recent international progress and continue pushing towards a place among the world's leading hockey nations with promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League firmly in their sights.



France

France arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 on the back of one of the most encouraging periods in the history of the women's programme. Following their historic Olympic debut at Paris 2024, Les Bleues continue to grow in confidence, experience and international stature.

Competing at the Olympic Games for the first time represented a major milestone for French women's hockey and highlighted the rapid progress the programme has made in recent years. That momentum was further strengthened by France's triumph at the inaugural Women's FIH Hockey Nations Cup 2 in 2025, where they captured the gold medal after an impressive tournament campaign.

France's rise has also been reflected in European competition, with the team earning promotion back to the elite EuroHockey Championship level after years of steady development. Combining tactical organisation with increasing attacking confidence, Les Bleues have shown they can compete effectively against a wide range of international opponents.

With a balanced squad featuring experienced leaders and emerging young talent, France brings ambition, resilience and belief into the Nations Cup. Having never appeared in the FIH Hockey Pro League in the past, the current generation is determined to continue reshaping the future of French women's hockey and establish itself consistently among the world's elite teams.



Korea

Korea arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 carrying one of the richest legacies in Asian women's hockey. Historically among the continent's most successful teams, Korea's achievements include Olympic silver medals, a World Cup bronze medal, multiple Asian Games titles and major international honours earned across decades of consistent excellence.

Renowned for their tactical discipline, structured defensive play and swift technical attacking patterns, Korea have long been recognised as one of the most organised and technically efficient teams in international hockey. While the programme is currently navigating a period of transition, the team continues to demonstrate the qualities that have defined Korean hockey for generations.

Following the disappointment of missing qualification for the Olympic Games Paris 2024 and the upcoming FIH Hockey World Cup 2026, Korea are focused on rebuilding and returning to the highest level of international competition. A youthful core has gained valuable experience together over recent seasons, with many players now entering an important stage in their development.

Despite the squad's relative youth, Korea remain a dangerous opponent capable of frustrating technically gifted teams through compact organisation and intelligent tactical play. The Nations Cup provides an important platform for the next generation of Korean players to continue their growth and push the team back towards the top tier of international hockey.

Hosts New Zealand arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup New Zealand 2025-26 as one of the favourites to challenge for the title and secure a return to the FIH Hockey Pro League. The Black Sticks are one of the most respected teams in world hockey, with a long history of success across major international competitions.

Renowned for their speed, physicality and attacking style of play, New Zealand have consistently competed at the highest level in the Olympic Games, FIH Hockey Women's World Cup and Commonwealth Games. Their achievements include a Commonwealth Games gold medal in 2018, multiple Oceania Cup titles and several strong finishes at global events.

The Black Sticks combine experienced internationals with an exciting generation of emerging players, creating a balanced squad capable of playing with both composure and intensity. Their aggressive pressing, fast ball movement and willingness to attack at pace make them one of the most dangerous teams in the competition.

Playing on home soil in front of passionate local support, New Zealand will be determined to make the most of the opportunity and deliver a strong campaign. With promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League firmly in their sights, the hosts enter the tournament aiming to reassert themselves among the world's leading women's hockey nations.
